Greg was born and raised in Christchurch, New Zealand before heading to Australia in his early twenties. Greg has been involved in a number of voluntary organisations and political causes over the years and is a passionate advocate for the environment and social equity to ensure a positive future for all. His career objective is to utilise his knowledge and experience to influence; and bring about change in the way New Zealanders engage with nature and conservation. He has worked for many local, regional and central government agencies in Australasia during his career in the environment, parks and recreation management. He has also worked in horticultural roles at the Christchurch and Brisbane Botanic Gardens, Centennial & Moore Park Trust and Sunnyside Hospital.

In November 2010, he was appointed to his current position as General Manager at Te Kohaka o Tuhaitara Trust.

Greg completed an apprenticeship in Horticulture and holds a Bachelor of Applied Management majoring in strategic management. # AUTUMN GARDEN SHOW

**And what a show it was, with three days of superb weather and the best possible venue in the Christchurch Botanic Gardens, the CHS can be very proud of this year's event.**

A record number of people attended, with numbers exceeding 14,000, our target had been what we thought was an aspirational figure of 10,000 and we nearly reached that on the second day. The figures totally prove that if you build something amazing people will come. At the welcome function numerous local dignitaries and sponsors and exhibitors were welcomed and shown around the event, the feedback from them was humbling, they all seemed highly impressed to see an event of this scale created in such a short period of time.

This year the CHS needed to put its best foot forward, to demonstrate what can be produced by being innovative and brave enough to take a risk on building a larger event on a bigger scale. The collaboration between club members of groups and societies and commercial businesses was amazing, the hum of happiness was evident throughout the show.

Vicki Buck, CCC councillor commented saying **"Awesome job Rachel, Sandi and Karen, you did brilliantly. Location superb, mix of activities great. Looking forward to bigger event next year, but right now you guys should just take a massive bow. Congrats too to the Horticultural Society for being bold"**

The show featured 23 different exhibitors from landscape architects and designers through to garden clubs, societies, community garden organisations, plant expert groups and horticultural companies. Children were a focus, with a dedicated area where they were immersed in colouring in activities in return for a free pot plant, plus a sand pit digging for treasure treat. Local garden club members, created a record 202 fresh floral posies. Show goers were excited to see new plants and innovative planting combinations too.

Visitors were greeted by delightfully costumed Jenny Gillies models, they were handed a program and welcomed to the event. Each afternoon visitors were able to watch a performance from the renowned fabric artist, which the crowds just flocked too. Wafts of fresh food also tickled the senses when the cooking demonstrations took part.

Some special thanks must go to Terra Viva Home and Garden as the principal partner of the show, the site beautification was world class. The Billy Goat Landscape Architecture exhibition was a crowd favourite, thank you to all your team for building such a top-notch garden. And a special mention must go to the Christchurch Botanic Gardens, the team that enabled us to produce this event were superb.

## MONTHLY TIPS & TASKS *with Michael Coulter*

In May we are well into Autumn and Winter is about to start. This means that we will slow down on what we need to do around the garden.

Most of the work involves general maintenance and cleaning up, in and around the garden by removing weeds, crop residues, lifting Summer perennials and bulbs and preparing ground for new plantings later in the Spring.

Winter is the time that we do much of our pruning to deciduous trees and shrubs so now is the time to sharpen and prepare the tools needed for this.

The compost heap made with fallen leaves and other green material will need to be turned and protected from the cold and wet rain so that it will break down quickly and be ready for use in the Spring.

Garlic and broad beans can be planted as and when ground conditions allow but only do so if the soil is workable. A lot of

the weeds that can choke young plants will grow fast with the cooler damp conditions that we get at this time of the year so remove them when they are small rather than hoeing and hoping that they will dry off and die.

Lawns will need fewer mowings so only mow to keep them looking tidy and do not cut too low and catch the clippings.

In the greenhouse remove crop residues as they finish and clean and wash down the inside and do any repairs that may be needed.

Remnant of the rainforests that once covered the Blackall Range, the Reserve is a living museum diverse plant and animal life which will delight with its tranquillity and beauty.
